ABDULRAZAK GURNAH WINS 2021 NOBEL PRIZE IN LITERATURE



Tanzanian writer Abdulrazak Gurnah won the 2021 Nobel Prize in Literature, the award-giving body said on Thursday. The Swedish Academy said, the award was in recognition of his "uncompromising and compassionate penetration of the effects of colonialism and the fate of the refugee in the gulf between cultures and continents". "The 2021 literature laureate Abdulrazak Gurnah's fourth novel 'Paradise' (1994), his breakthrough as a writer, evolved from a research trip to East Africa around 1990. It is a coming of age account and a sad love story in which different worlds and belief systems collide," said the Jury. The prize is awarded by the Swedish Academy and is worth 10 million Swedish crowns (\$1.14 million). (\$1 = 8.7856 Swedish crowns).

■ Gurnah, who grew up on the island of Zanzibar but arrived in England as a refugee in the 1960s, has published 10 novels as well as a number of short stories. The Nobel committee said that "the theme of the refugee's disruption runs throughout his work"

■ His novel 'Paradise' was shortlisted for the Booker Prize in 1994

INDIA'S GDP GROWTH IN 2021-22 SEEN AT 8.3%: WORLD BANK



India's economy, South Asia's largest, is expected to grow by 8.3% in the fiscal year 2021-22, aided by an increase in public investment and incentives to boost manufacturing, according to the latest report from the World Bank. It backed shifting to a services sector-led growth model for the region to strengthen the recovery.

"Over the next two years, as the base effect fades, growth is expected to stabilise at around 7%, aided by structural reforms to ease supply-side constraints and infrastructure investment. In the medium term, uncertainty around asset-quality deterioration from the pandemic, higher-than-expected inflation, and slow recovery in the informal sector are the main downside risks," according to the report

WHO recommends world's first malaria vaccine for children at risk

The World Health Organisation on Wednesday endorsed the RTS,S/AS01 malaria vaccine, the first against the mosquito-borne disease that kills more than 400,000 people a year, mostly African children. The decision followed a review of a pilot programme deployed since 2019 in Ghana, Kenya and Malawi in which more than two million doses were given of the vaccine, first made by the pharmaceutical company GSK in 1987.

■ Many vaccines exist against viruses and bacteria but this was the first time that the WHO recommended for broad use a vaccine against a human parasite
■ The vaccine acts against plasmodium falciparum – one of the five malaria parasite species and the most deadly



A 'Whole School' SAFETY approach

Four years after a seven-year-old boy was found murdered in an international school in Gurugram, the Union education ministry has drawn up school safety and accountability guidelines on the orders of the Supreme Court and suggestions of an expert committee. The new 'Guidelines on School Safety and Security' circulated this week to all states for implementation across all government and private schools, list out 11 categories of 'negligence' for which school administration will be held accountable.

The new guidelines are based on three key ideas – accountability and legal framework with all relevant laws; a 'whole school' safety approach with clear demarcated responsibilities for all stakeholders – from teachers to non-teaching staff, school management and parent. Non-compliance will attract fines up to 5% of the total revenue in the preceding year for a private school with bar on fresh admissions and even possible derecognition


THE GUIDELINES

1 The guidelines have specified actionable 'negligences' that include the failure to provide timely medical aid to students, delay in actions in times of disaster or crime, security-related lapses, suppression of facts and not reporting to the appropriate authority

2 Those apart, negligence in establishing a secured infrastructure for the students and children with special needs, negligence in the quality of food and water, laxity in taking action against a complaint reported by a student figure among the categories

3 Corporal punishment, including mental and emotional harassment, failure to prevent bullying, discriminatory actions, substance abuse, lapses in implementation of Covid-19 guidelines will also invite action by the government

4 The guidelines also call on states to include conditions for fixing responsibility of safety and security on school management/principal/head of school in private schools among the conditions for recognition of schools as mandated under Section 18(2) of the Right to Education Act



BOND GETS A GRAND welcome



The latest James Bond movie took a mighty \$121 million at the international box office over its opening weekend, Universal Pictures said on Monday. The British and Irish box office led the way with a total of \$35 million, making 'No Time to Die' the biggest movie release during the coronavirus pandemic and the highest opening three-day weekend ever in the UK and Ireland for a Bond movie.

The film, which marks actor Daniel Craig's fifth and final outing as the British secret agent, was delayed three times from its planned April 2020 release date because of the pandemic

The action movie, which cost an estimated \$200 million to produce, won warm reviews, with many film critics saying it was worth the wait

TELEGRAM GAINS 70 MN NEW USERS IN ONE DAY AFTER FB OUTAGE

As Facebook experienced a nearly six-hour outage across its services this week, messaging app Telegram gained over 70 million new users. Facebook, WhatsApp, Instagram and



In January, Telegram crossed 500 million monthly active users

Messenger went down for millions of users, including in India, on Monday evening, as they were unable to send or receive messages on social media platforms. According to DownDetector, a website that tracks WhatsApp outages, 40 per cent users were unable to download the app, 30 per cent had trouble in sending messages and 22 per cent had problems with the web version.

BRUCE SPRINGSTEEN HANDWRITTEN LYRICS, HARMONICAS SET FOR AUCTION

Handwritten lyrics by rock legend Bruce Springsteen songs 'Thunder Road', 'For You', and 'Night' are set to hit the auction block later this month. The sale will also include two harmonicas which were used on the original recordings of 'Thunder Road' and 'Johnny 99', when bidding kicks off on October 28 via Bonhams.

Written by Springsteen, the four-page 'Thunder Road' manuscript is in pen on ruled notebook paper, and features two different drafts of the opening verse. It is estimated to sell for somewhere between \$50,000 and \$70,000.



Everyone around started laughing. He got angry and shouted at us. We apologised and explained that it was an accident. He forgave us and asked us to be careful.


Moral: We should be careful while playing and accept our mistake.



IPL 2.0

WITH AN EYE ON IPL PLAY-OFFS SPOT, MI FACE SRH IN 'MUST WIN' GAME

Five-time champions MI will need to outclass bottom-placed SRH in the last league match in IPL

Courtesy their eight-wicket win over Rajasthan Royals, the defending champions are currently at the fifth spot, with 12 points from 13 games, with a net run rate of -0.048. Ishan Kishan played an unbeaten knock of 50 runs off just 25 balls with the help of five 4s and three 6s to help Mumbai Indians defeat Rajasthan Royals by eight wickets with 70 balls to spare at the Sharjah Cricket Stadium. The match results between KKR and RR has further altered the net run rate. In this scenario, MI may find it very difficult to qualify for the play-offs even if they beat SRH as the gap in their NRR with KKR is not small. A win will not be enough for MI to seal the fourth play-off spot as they still will be left with just 14 points.

MI'S TROUBLED MIDDLE ORDER

In any case, Rohit (363 runs) will have to lead from the front again. He has got starts but has not been able to convert them, and the great white-ball exponent would be itching for a big score. And so would be his opening partner Ishan Kishan (157 runs), whose confi-



dence would have been boosted from his unbeaten fifty against RR. MI's horribly out of form middle order, comprising the supremely talented Suryakumar Yadav (235 runs), all-rounders Hardik Pandya (117 runs), Kieron Pollard (232) and Saurabh Tiwary (115 runs), will have to come good. On their day, they can take any opposition attack to the cleaners and SRH's would be no exception. MI team management would, however, be pleased with the performance of their bowlers, who had restricted RR for a meagre 90 and are unlikely to tinker with the combination. Pace spearhead Jasprit Bumrah (19 wickets) was exceptional and would be raring to bowl his yorkers again. He would need support from Trent Boult, Nathan Coulter-Nile, who grabbed four wickets in the last game, and spinner Jayant Yadav.

SRH TO FINISH ON HIGH

The Sunrisers, who are already out of reckoning for a play-offs berth, will look to finish the tournament on a high. Skipper Kane Williamson was back among the runs and would be keen to start from where he left on Wednesday. But the Kiwi will need support from others like Jason Roy and relatively inexperienced guys like Abhishek Sharma, Priyam Garg, Abdul Samad and aggressive Wriddhiman Saha. With the addition of pace sensation Urman Malik, SRH have one of the best bowling attacks and the likes of Bhuvneshwar Kumar, Rashid Khan and Sidarth Kaul would have to be at their best to contain MI's explosive batting line up. Also, the contribution of West Indian all-rounder Jason Holder, both with the bat and ball, could be decisive. **PH**

All eight teams are capable of beating each other. But the good thing is that KKR plays before us, so we will know what to do.

While the Delhi side (20 points from 13 matches) has made sure of a top-two finish, a defeat at the hands of Sunrisers Hyderabad on Wednesday night has dented RCB's chances of ending second in the points table. With 16 points and an inferior net run-rate to second-placed Chennai Super Kings, RCB's hopes of a top-two finish has reduced after losing to SRH. Skipper Virat Kohli, however, will get a clear idea on how to go about in their final match to snatch the second spot, which appears a tough task to say the least. Despite possessing a formidable batting line-up that includes AB de Villiers, Glenn Maxwell and Devdutt Padikkal apart from Kohli, RCB couldn't chase down a below-par 141-7 against SRH and they would need to sort out their batting before entering the knockout stage.

RCB'S IMPRESSIVE BOWLING UNIT

Maxwell has been in scintillating form for RCB after a moderate run in 2020 and can turn things around single-handedly as can de Villiers. The Australian power-hitter has 447



runs with five 50s and will want to continue the good run, while de Villiers hasn't quite had the impact he would have liked to. If Kohli can get off to a strong start at the top alongside the impressive Padikkal, the powerful middle-order can do a lot of damage. RCB's bowling unit too have done well with the likes of Mohammed Siraj, Harshal Patel and George Garton doing the job in the pace department. In spin department, Yuzvendra Chahal has overcome his past struggles with some very impressive spells this season, while Shahbaz Ahmed too has kept things in check for his team.

DC'S STRONG BATTING LINE-UP

The Rishabh Pant-led Delhi team, on the other hand, has been in formidable form, winning four of the last five matches and will look to end things on a high in the league phase before going into the qualifier. Skipper Pant has come in for criticism for being over-aggressive and it has to be seen if he shows a sense of restraint and makes bigger contributions. DC has a strong batting line-up despite the inconsistency of Prithvi Shaw, who most often seems to blow hot and cold while Shikhar Dhawan (501 runs from 13 innings) has shown his value at the top. Shreyas Iyer and Pant too have rescued the team few times but they will seek more consistency. Delhi has a potent bowling attack. While South African pacer Anrich Nortje is a constant threat, his compatriot Kagiso Rabada and Avesh Khan (22 scalps) have been at the batsmen all the time. The spin duo of R Ashwin and Axar Patel (14 wickets) also have not been easy to get away. **PH**
