RIGHT TO REJECT SHOULD VOTERS HAVE THIS RIGHT? SC ASKS CENTRE, EC

THE QUESTION:

Eight years after giving the voters 'none of the above' (NOTA) option in the elections, the Supreme Court on Monday asked the Centre and the Election Commission whether it would be legally permissible to reject all the candidates in the fray, if NOTA votes exceeded that of the candidate securing the highest number of votes.

WHY NOW?

The apex court's query came after it agreed to entertain a PIL, in which the petitioners have claimed that though NOTA was an option for the voters, it didn't appear to have prodded political parties to select "good candidates" sans criminal antecedents, as the number of NOTA votes had no impact on the outcome of elections. The apex court, however said, such a move could cause disruptions in the formation of Parliament and Assemblies after polls.

THE OPTION

NOTA as an option was introduced in EVMs on the basis of a 2013 SC judgment. Before NOTA, the voter had to inform the presiding officer of

his/ her decision, in case, he/she decided not to vote for any candidate. In 2013, the SC ruled that this violated the freedom of expression of the voter and the ethics of secret ballot

THE LIMIT

On October 29, 2013, the EC had issued a circular saying that in the event of NOTA getting votes, which exceed the number of votes polled by any candidate, then the one with

DOES NOTA MATTER?

Opinions are divided. Votaries of this option are of the view that NOTA is a tool of political dissent to express disillusionment with the ruling party. It also tells the opposition that for the NOTA voter, there is no worthwhile alternative candidate or party to turn to. SPECTATORS BARRED FROM TOKYO OLYMPICS TORCH RELAY START: ORGANISERS

Spectators will be barred from attending the beginning of the Tokyo Olympics torch relay, organisers have said, announcing a pared-back launch, as the countdown to the postponed Games begins in earnest. Fans were told to stay away from the next week's "simplified" starting ceremony and the first leg of the nationwide relay, which was put on hold a year ago when the Olympics were delayed over the coronavirus. "The grand start ceremony and the first section of the Fukushima torch relay... will not be open to the public," organisers said in a statement, adding that the festivities would be broadcast live online.

1 The announcement comes ahead of a decision on whether fans from overseas will be allowed to enter Japan for the coronavirus-delayed Games, which is expected to be taken before the torch relay begins on March 25

2 The torch relay will begin in Fukushima prefecture, which last week marked the 10th anniversary of the 2011 earthquake, tsunami and nuclear disaster that left 18,500 dead or missing

3 But the torch, headed for the Olympics opening ceremony on July 23, will get a more muted send-off than originally-planned, the organisers clarified

'AVATAR' BEATS 'AVENGERS: ENDGAME' to become highest-grossing film of all time



Director James Cameron's 'Avatar' has claimed its box office throne as the highest-grossing film of all time, overtaking Marvel's 'Avengers: Endgame'. This comes in nearly two years after the Marvel superhero film created box office history by grossing an estimated \$2.797 billion. 'Avatar', which re-released in China last Friday added another \$12.3 million to its overall haul in the first two days, thus taking its worldwide gross to an estimated \$2.802 billion.



'Endgame' took the first spot on the box office board in 2019, when it beat Cameron's 1997 film

'Titanic', which held the top spot for over a decade with an estimated global collection of \$2.194 billion

According to NASA, the pallet is moving just 4.8 miles per second and is not expected to survive the intense heat when it reaches the Earth's atmosphere.

Amazon rainforest now spews out more greenhouse gases than it can store

The Amazon rainforest now spews out more greenhouse gases than it can store, a study has found. Analysis shows the net impact on the environment of the tropical rainforest, the most-biodiverse place in the world, has become negative as a result of human actions. Deforestation, illegal fires and cattle farming have led to increased flooding and more frequent droughts, which means the forest is now spewing out higher levels of methane and nitrous oxide than it is soaking up carbon dioxide. Worryingly, the findings indicate that the Amazon rainforest may actually be making global warming worse rather than helping to mitigate it.

- Researchers say that the Amazon 'is one of the largest ecosystem carbon pools on the Earth' and stores up to 200 gigaton of carbon, equivalent to all the carbon emissions humans produced for five years. (One gigaton is the same as 1,000,000,000 tons)
- Amazonian trees alone emit 3.5 per cent of all global methane through a variety of ways

6 ways to defuse sibling resentment

Sibling rivalry is expected, especially with everyone stuck indoors for months, but there are ways to mitigate the issue

Sibling screaming matches may seem louder and more oppressive during a pandemic when no one is leaving the house, but according to Jeanine Vivona, a professor of psychology at the College of New Jersey, US, who has studied sibling rivalry, "competition with siblings is just a fact of life." Some observational studies have shown that sibling conflicts may happen up to eight times an hour. Here are six ways to handle squabbling siblings:

FIGURE OUT WHAT SETS THEM OFF

"Pay attention to what tends to happen before conflict breaks out," said Sally Beville Hunter, a clinical associate professor in child and family studies at the University of Tennessee, US. If your children fight every time they play video games, for example, make sure you are within earshot when they sit down to play. Listen for words or tones that are combative and try to intervene before it escalates.



HELP THEM TO RESOLVE CONFLICT

Once tempers have settled, sit your kids down and discuss the problem "without blaming or accusing," advises Mark Ethan Feinberg, an expert in sibling behaviour at Penn State University, US. Give each child a chance to talk uninterrupted, and have them try to come up with solu-

tions themselves. By the time kids are elementary school age, they can "evaluate which of those solutions are win-win and which ones are most likely to work over time," he said.

PRaise IN PUBLIC; PUNISH IN PRIVATE

If your children are being kind to each other, "praise really loudly and all over the place," Hunter said. For

example, "I love that you let your sister go first." But if you are criticising them, do it outside of the other child's earshot, because they may use it as ammunition.

FIND COMMON ACTIVITIES

Your kids' temperament and personalities may be similar, or they may not be. They may both love dance or sports. "Try to find common activities that allow everyone to be flexible and feel connected," Vivona said.

EMBRACE CONFLICT

Don't be afraid to choose an activity, like family movie night, that might result in a long delay as children argue over which one to watch. You are going to experience the rivalry but it will make your children learn all about compromise.

SEND THEM OUTSIDE

Being cooped up indoors is hard for children. So organise outdoor activities to get them some fresh air and fun. NEW YORK TIMES




'My tools are my words'

The 10-year-old Khushi has been writing since she was five. The budding author has made quite a splash with her first work 'The Bunny Who Cooked Macaroni', a collection of prose and poetry that tells the story of a miserable bunny, Bob, who is forced to cook macaroni all day instead of following his passion to be an artist. Through Bob's journey, the young author, wants the reader to understand the importance of self-reflection and dedication in one's life. In an interview, she shares her best writing tips.

What inspired you to write about living an uninspired life?

It occurred with an incident where a bunny was trapped in its miserable tiny cage. I had pity for his woebegone cast life. I pondered about it and thought I could write a story where the bunny is expressing his own thoughts and having emotional blows. He would be



forced to do something whereas he wants to do something else. I describe the way he strived through his tough life with the help of his sweet and encouraging friends.

What kind of poems do you like to write?

At night time, I start writing poetry, when I am alone and peaceful. I always pick interesting topics that would appeal to the reader. I prefer simple AABB rhyming scheme. I think a poem is a compressed song. I

out different emotions because I am according to my mood. In the process of my poetry writing, I was always pending with a few poems which I was yet to complete. Each poem's mood was different too. It is like a menu I can choose from. That's how I wrote my poems alongside. So, I kept on writing till I wrote around sixty poems. Out of that, about thirty poems are in the book.



Who are your mentors?

My writing mentors are undoubtedly my parents. They encouraged me throughout the journey. They motivated me to keep on writing. Thus, I became my own mate. This book would have merely been a bundle of words without their love and support. My teachers were helpful too and they told me to never stop writing. I never will stop; the journey has just begun!

How did you motivate yourself to keep at it? Since writing requires one to spend long hours alone, was

there ever a point where you'd think 'I'm not doing it'?

Writing is my passion, so it was my love for writing that made me keep the 'I can do it' attitude. It is my entertainment. I play with words as I play with my toys. I manage my time wisely, which gives me enough time to write. I was never alone. My mother was by my side. The characters were my friends. I talked to them and they talked to me. I was the inventor: Being the author gives me the liberty to decide what the characters look like and do; they were my puppets. It is fun cooking a story, where I can decide what I want. I was never bored; I used to wait for the time when I could write. When you have fun, long hours become few seconds. There was never a time when I thought I couldn't do it. A person doesn't need to be reminded twice to pig out on pizza!

Why do you write?

I simply loved writing. I adored it, I didn't find it, writing found me. I pour my heart's content in it. I want to convey everything to people by my writing. When you love something, you are inspired by it. Inspiration rests in everything, you just have to feel it. I started to write since the age of five. At first, I used to write page-long essays about me and my friends. A year later, I moved onto other things. I started writing short stories about nature. After that, I started writing juicy stuff; I wrote stories up to a hundred pages. Then, I started writing novels.



WRITING TIPS

- NEVER** force yourself to write. When you least expect it, your thoughts pour out. **DON'T** write for the sake of others. Write if you want, or don't. Don't worry whether people will like it or not. If you like it, it's the best. Focus more on the content than other things.
- It takes months and years to write a book. It's not ten days of work - so keep calm and relax. First, draft the entire story on paper. When you're satisfied with your points, you can begin writing your fabulous story.
- ALWAYS** write in peace. **NEVER** write in a jiffy. **DON'T** stress if you can't find words. Leave it, move on to something else.
- DON'T** stick to the facts. Go wild. Take your imagination for a ride! Observe what is around you. You will surely find great ideas for your masterpiece.


2 Birthday Cakes you can make in 10 mins

Does the thought of baking a cake at home seem like a daunting task, especially with the icing and edible decoratives? Well, here's help. Just follow some easy steps given below and impress your loved ones



CHOCOLATE CAKE

To begin with, take a baking tin/tray and grease it with oil/butter and keep it aside. Take a large bowl and sieve 1/2 cup of all purpose flour, 1/2 cup cocoa powder and mix these with 1 1/2 teaspoon baking powder, 1 teaspoon baking soda, 1/2 cup sugar, 2 eggs, 1/2 cup melted butter. Make a smooth batter, to make it more fluffy add in some milk to make the batter smooth. Pour the batter into the greased baking tray and bake the cake at 200 degree celsius. In the meantime, melt 200 gram milk chocolate and using the double boiler method, prepare the ganache. Once the cake is ready, pour the ganache and allow it to set, garnish the way you like and enjoy!



STRAWBERRY CAKE

To make this amazing cake, take 1 cup strawberries and prepare a puree, add 1 cup all purpose flour to the puree and mix nicely. Add 1/2 cup melted butter and 1/2 cup caster sugar, whisk into a smooth mixture then add in 2 eggs, 1 teaspoon baking soda, 1 1/2 teaspoon baking powder along with a few drops of vanilla essence. Using an electrical blender, make a smooth blend by adding some milk/water, make a smooth lump free batter. Grease a baking pan and pour the batter, add in the chunks of strawberry, bake the cake. Then take a bowl add in 1/2 cup strawberries puree/ strawberry syrup, 1 cup chilled fresh cream, keep whisking and lastly add in 1/2 cup of sugar and some vanilla extract for taste, whisk a smooth icing cream and layer the cake. Garnish the way you like and enjoy. T.M.



DO OR DIE

India would aim to take the toss out of equation and put up a much improved all-round show against a formidable England in their bid to level the series in the fourth Twenty20 in Ahmedabad on Thursday



India must negate the toss factor to win

As the trend of chasing the side winning the match continues in the ongoing T20I series between India and England, former player Michael Vaughan said that it looked like the T20 World Cup, scheduled to be played later in the year, could be won by the best Tossers. So far of the five matches, three have been played and in every match, the toss-winning side has gone on to win the game. In all three games, the toss-winning captain has opted to field first. However, India skipper Virat Kohli has repeatedly stressed on the need to do well whether posting totals or chasing as part of preparations for the T20 World Cup later this year.

Must utilise powerplays

In the two games they lost after batting first, India struggled in the powerplay, which impacted their final total despite one batsman (Shreyas Iyer and Virat Kohli respectively) going on to make a significant contribution. A lot of it was down to K L Rahul not being amongst the runs but Kohli made it amply clear that the Karnataka batsman and Rohit Sharma remain their preferred opening combination. "If you look at his stats in the last 2-3 years, they are better than anyone in T20. He will continue to be one of our main batters, along with Rohit, at the top. We don't have any concerns there," said Kohli. India batting coach Vikram Rathour too has termed Rahul 'best batsman in the team' for the T20 format.

The express pace of Mark Wood and Jofra Archer has also made life tough for the Indians in the first six overs. They have been able to extract disconcerting bounce from the surface, putting the batsmen in two minds.

Bowlers need to step up

Going by Kohli's words post the third game, a third all-rounder alongside Hardik Pandya and Washington Sundar can be drafted into the side with the

choice between uncapped Rahul Tewatia and Axar Patel. Unlike the first game, Kohli's sublime 77 ensured India did have some runs to defend but the bowlers hardly troubled the opposition batsmen, with Jos Buttler running away with the contest. The team's number one spinner Yuzvendra Chahal has leaked runs both times India have set a target. Hardik Pandya's return as a bowling all-rounder has been promising but he is yet to take a wicket. Bhuvneshwar Kumar has kept things tidy in his comeback series but the team expects him to provide regular breakthroughs with the new ball. Offie Washington Sundar has been the stand out bowler for India with four wickets at an impressive economy rate of 6.95.

Neutralise Buttler threat

England, like India, also want to win in all conditions and will be buoyed by their emphatic win in the previous game. Buttler being amongst the runs is also a cause of worry for India as on his day he can demolish any attack in the world. Jonny Bairstow, who had a horror run in the two Tests he played against India, came up with a morale boosting 40 on Tuesday. Now England are waiting for the world's number one batsman Dawid Malan to fire. It will take a special effort from India to stop the number one ranked team from winning the series on Wednesday night. The hosts winning the toss should make their task less tough.

MORGAN HAS TAKEN ENG WHITE-BALL GAME TO NEXT LEVEL: BUTTLER


Morgan, who ended his country's 44-year wait for a maiden ODI World Cup title in 2019, on Tuesday became the first England player and fourth overall to make 100 appearances in T20 cricket. He celebrated the milestone moment with an eight-wicket win over India in the third T20. Buttler, who was earlier seen in a finisher's role, further said he's got full backing from Morgs (Eoin Morgan) to go and do that and that gives me a lot of confidence. And I think, I really enjoyed the role today as I always do," Buttler, who scored a match-winning unbeaten 83, said. "Yeah, it's (opening) my preference in T20 cricket. But I'll always be open-minded, I'm sure certain teams may ask me to bat somewhere else but I know Morgs is keen for me to open in this team and do that with his backing."

They (Morgan and Kevin Pietersen) were two guys I always looked up to in white ball teams and who could do a bit different, who could take the game forward and look to be ahead of the curve. He's been a pioneer, as a player to start with. And certainly as a captain and a leader. He's taken English white ball cricket to a place, it's never been before, to be honest. He's done that in quite an incredible way.

Everyone enjoys playing for him. The environment that he's created, the group we have at the moment is as much fun to play in as ever. As a really good team, he's been a huge driver of that, alongside a few others. He is a selfless guy. Today is really about him and no mean feat to achieve 100 caps.
