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Nehru Centenary Tribal Museum - Exploring the Tribal Culture Grade IV

Educational field trips enrich students' knowledge by providing a multidimensional learning experience that goes beyond textbooks and lectures. They are gateways to cultural, historical and scientific discoveries that leave a lasting imprint on students' minds and fostering a lifelong love for learning.

Delhi Public School , Miyapur, arranged a field trip for the students of Grade IV on Friday, October 6,2023. Students were accompanied by their class teachers, language teachers and PET teachers. Students boarded the bus at 8.30 am and were so excited upon reaching the destination, Nehru Centenary Tribal Museum, which is dedicated to the social and cultural life of tribal communities in Telangana.

Established in 2003, this museum offers a great opportunity to peep into the lives of tribes. It is a two-storey red coloured building with stunning carvings that resonate with the cultures of tribal people. Students were amazed by the life-like sculptures of tribal people going out on their daily work with their

bullock carts. There were various tools on display such as fish and rat traps, hunting equipment like bows and arrows, musical instruments and agricultural tools. Scenes of tribal dance are also sketched which gives the students an idea of their musical taste and culture. Students were particularly excited to watch a video in the mini auditorium on the lifestyles of various tribal communities like



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Gonds, Yerukulas, Lambada and Savaras.



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38 Students of Grade 6 accompanied by a staff of five members and two tour operators went on an educational trip to Vizag- Araku during the Dussehra break .

DAY 1 - HYDERABAD TO VISAKHAPATNAM

Children boarded the train on 15th October 2023 at the Secunderabad railway station. It was an overnight journey to Visakhapatnam. The following morning, the group checked into the hotel. The hotel had a wonderful ambience and the food was delicious.

DAY 2- VISAKHAPATNAM

After a rest period of a few hours, children were taken for local sightseeing. They had a thrilling time at the Kailasagiri Ropeway and Submarine Museum. The exquisite evening spent on the RK Beach was pleasant and fascinating.

DAY 3- VISAKHAPATNAM - ARAKU VALLEY

The onboard bus journey across a distance of 111 km to Araku took 3 hours. Children had a whale of a time , singing , dancing and cracking jokes on their way to Araku.

The visit to Tribal Museum was on the cards followed by a visit to Coffee Museum. The tribal village setup was a visual treat and children looked beautiful all clad in tribal wear and posed for the cameras to give their



best shot. They had hands-on experience by a plethora of activities that were conducted by the tribal museum authorities. They enjoyed lacbangle making, painting , and mask decor. They felt proud and happy to buy souvenirs from the tribal village for their families back home. The cozy evening ended with a campfire at the hotel.

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DAY 4 ARAKU VALLEY

Day 4 at Araku Valley started with a yoga and meditation session. Mr. Jaishankar, one of the accompanying teachers, ensured that children did some form of yoga postures and meditation. It added to the positive vibes in the scenic beauty of Araku Valley. After breakfast , children visited KolaPuttu village . The adventurous activities like trekking, zipline, rappelling , raft building added to the fun and excitement. Dhimsa tribal dance in the evening was a must watch event.

DAY 5 ARAKU-HYDERABAD

Day 5, children visited Madugundu village for a short hike. Children were felicitated at the closing ceremony. They received certificates and Special mentions for their participation. They reached Vizag via road and finally boarded the train and reached Hyderabad after an

overnight journey.



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The six-day long tour was indeed an incredibly enriching experience for all students wherein they acquired innumerable life skills, learnt a lot and above all became more independent and responsible in this journey. This was truly a precious journey in terms of a learning adventure that created tons of beautiful memories.


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Bangaluru - Mysore - Coorg

"Excursions are like bookmarks in the novel of education, marking the pages where real learning happens."

At DPS Miyapur, learning happens beyond the four walls of the classroom and excursions play a significant role in the overall education experience, offering a range of benefits that extend beyond the classroom. Students of Grade 7 were taken to **Bangalore - Mysore - Coorg** in collaboration with Travel Education Company - Edterra. The journey started on 14th October and ended on 19th October. These 6 days of travel provided students with hands-on, real-world experiences that complemented the theoretical knowledge gained in the classroom. The travel team included -

- 55 students, divided into 6 groups
- 7 teachers
- Edterra travel mentor



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Day 1 - Hyderabad to Bangalore via AC Sleeper Bus (14th October, 2023)

Students along with their parents assembled in the school at around 8pm. They were all excited to board the bus along with their buddies and incharge teachers. They were given the necessary bus travel instructions beforehand by the Edterra team and the same was followed throughout the **bus trip to Bangalore**. Once they boarded the bus and settled, children

were given snacks and water which they joyfully munched while singing, dancing and playing throughout the trip. The overnight journey to Bangalore was safe, smooth and entertaining.



Day 2 - Bangalore (15th October, 2023)

The second day of travel included a visit to **Vishweshwaraiah Science Museum**, Drive past Vidhan Sabha and High Court and ISKCON Temple. The students reached the President Hotel, Bangalore at around 9:00 am. Students, in groups of four, were handed over the keys to their rooms. After freshening up, all of them assembled in the 4th floor restaurant. The theme of the restaurant was that of a cave, the staff of the restaurant were dressed as forest officers, and this was a completely new experience for all the students. The breakfast was delicious. After this, the students took some rest and after lunch, boarded the bus to visit Vishweshwaraiah Science Museum. While going there, pleasant music was played in the bus and everyone had a lot of fun travelling. A group photo was taken before heading in the museum. The museum was filled with many science related sections divided in three floors covering technical science, herbs and grasses, space and dinosaurs.

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The team got on the bus again and passed by the **Vidhan Sabha and the High Court**. Teacher in charge Ms. Dolly Bhatt, Social Science subject expert, briefed the students about the same and the important points were noted by the students. Finally the team reached the famous **ISKCON Temple**. Everyone was fascinated to see the majestic temple with thousands of devotees stepping onto the 108 marble slabs while chanting the holy phrase, 'Hare Krishna, Hare Ram'. The team prayed for a safe journey ahead and sought blessings for their loved ones. This was followed by shopping in the temple premises. The team then reached the hotel at 8pm and changed to comfortable clothes and had an amazing dinner.



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Day 3 Mysore (16th October, 2023)

On 16th October, after a lavish breakfast in the President Hotel's banquet hall, we boarded the buses and started off to Mysore. We drove for around two and a half hours covering the distance of 142 kms. The students kept themselves entertained with games and songs throughout the long drive. When we finally reached Mysore, the opulent **Mysore Palace**, also called Amba Vilas Palace, greeted us.

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We were asked to remove our footwear to keep the palace floor clean and also to prevent any damage to the wooden flooring and floor paintings. The Palace belongs to the Wodeyar Dynasty. We were astounded by its beauty as it shimmered, sparkled and shone in the light of the midday sun. We heard that the current scion of the Wodeyar Dynasty still lives behind the palace and participates in functions during the Dussehra Festival.

With the help of the guide, we learnt that the palace is the official residence of the Wadiyar dynasty who ruled the kingdom of Mysore from 1399 to 1950. The original palace which was built out of wood was destroyed by a fire in the late 19th century and was reconstructed by Krishnarajendra Wadiyar IV. The highlight of this palace is the two Durbar halls which display the Indo-Saracenic style of architecture.

The palace heavily borrows the Indo Saracenic structure and blends in elements from the Gothic, Rajput and Muslim styles. The numerous paintings by renowned painter Raja Ravi Varma charmed us with the optical illusions. Outside the palace, the students engaged in shopping for souvenirs.







We had a palatable lunch at Galore Inn and journeyed onwards to our next destination, Coorg, covering about 94 kms in the bus. It was late evening when we reached our next stay, **The Yellow Bamboo Resort and Spa**. The students were allotted the rooms where they freshened up quickly for a divine dinner at the dining hall, after which everyone hit the hay.

Day 4 Coorg (17th October, 2023)

The day started with a 3-4 km trek through a coffee and black pepper plantation where saw many varieties of black pepper and coffee plants. After the morning trek, we got on our bus and started on the trip to **Abbey Falls**. When we reached the site we couldn't stop admiring the beautiful milky waterfalls. Next, we reached the **Raja's Seat Viewpoint** which was an overview of the entire city of Coorg. The picturesque setting surrounded by hills was a view to be captured.

For lunch, the Edterra team got all of us mouth watering Dominos Meal. After relishing it, we had a 2 hour trip to the **Dubare** Elephant Camp. Right as we got off the bus, it started raining.



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At first, it was drizzling but soon it became a heavy rain and we were completely drenched. Luckily, as we got on our boat it was fun as it was raining. When we reached the entrance we went in near an elephant shelter and some of the teachers and students fed the elephants.

We then went back to the resort and changed our clothes as we were wet and went to have dinner. This was followed by a **campfire** and dance to the tunes of Indian and Rock music.





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Day 5 Mysore (18th October, 2023)

On the 5th day of the Southern Triangle: Bangalore-Mysore-Coorg trip, the students of DPS, Miyapur reached Mysore and had a refreshing breakfast at the hotel. The students were then taken to the much-awaited **Mysore Zoo** or Shri Chamarajendra Zoological Gardens which is one of the oldest zoos in India. The students witnessed a wide range of wild species amidst its rich breed of flora and fauna.

The rare species of animals were kept in well-spaced enclosures and the students were delighted to see them move around freely. The Mysore Zoo was not just a place of recreation but also served as a good educational center for imparting knowledge on the conservation of wildlife.

On the way to Coorg, the students visited The Namdroling Monastery, popularly referred to as '**The Golden Temple**'. The students learnt that it is one of the largest Tibetan settlements in India. Located in Bylakuppe, about 5 kms from Kushalanagara in Kodagu district, they were excited to know that the Golden Temple complex is home to about 16000 refugees and 600 monks. The main attractions inside the temple were the statues of Lord Buddha in the centre with statues of Lord Amitayus and Lord

Padmasambhava on either side. Visitors were praying, meditating and giving their offerings. Some visitors also rotated the prayer drums. The students were enlightened on the belief that followed these Rotating prayer drums. It was believed to give the same benefit as chanting "Om Mani Padme Hum", the Buddhist prayer.



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Our last halt was the beautiful **Brindavan Garden**s. The garden was completely illuminated and a breathtaking sight to see. It had stunning water fountains and the best part was the dancing fountain. The music and the fountain moving as per the tunes was a feast to our eyes.

Day 6 Bangalore to Hyderabad via Flight (19th October, 2023)

On the 19th morning, the weary children were excited to finally be able to meet up with their parents and tell them the exciting pearls of experience they had gathered all throughout their excursion. The bus started from Mysore after breakfast and reached **Bangalore International Airport** at 2 pm. We took the flight after a hassle free security check in.

After both the flights landed all the children took the bus from Hyderabad International Airport to school for a long awaited reunion with their parents. The parents warmly welcomed the children back home eager to listen to their endless stories. These six days of travel have provided students with loads of learning and beautiful memories etched in their memories forever.



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First was the strawberry farms. Though it was about 15 days early for the strawberry harvest, we got to know about the process of cultivating strawberries right from sowing the seeds to harvesting the fruits. We complimentary got а strawberry ice cream from the farmer who also runs an eatery outside the farm. It was one of the best ice creams made out of fresh strawberries, we ever had. We then Mapro headed to Gardens, the firm that is famous for its jams, juices, and other products. We could see the production of Kakhra (Indian snack).





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Most of the students bought jams, juices, and snacks from the company's outlet on the same premises. They also have a beautiful garden with a spectacular view of the valley. Paris viewpoint was the last destination, it quickly turned dark, and we returned back to the hotel excited and exhausted. 
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FATEHPUR SIKRI:




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LKG



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English Verbs

Verbs are very important for language development because they allow children to start building sentences. The choice of



verb determines the grammatical form in a sentence.

Students were given mixed cards including verbs and nouns for this exercise. One student must choose a card, and the other must read and carry out the task. The first pupil must then determine if it is a verb or a noun. The children read and performed actions for each verb, which made them very happy and enthused about the entire activity.

Conclusion:

Students were able to define and identify different types of verbs. Students were able to demonstrate correct usage of different verbs including helping verbs.



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Math Skip Counting:

Skip counting is often introduced to young children as a way to further develop their counting skills and build their knowledge of multiples.

Students were introduced to this topic through a hopscotch skip counting practice. By marking numbers on the ground and telling them to land on the right number while omitting 2, 3, or 5. Youngsters hopped on the numbers and had a great time during the session.

Spatial relationships:

Developing spatial skills requires children to use both their bodies and their minds. As children learn to navigate physical space and objects, they also develop important motor skills such as hand-eye coordination and balance.





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Kids have completed this task by making drawings on the board and using real things to demonstrate.

Conclusion:

The hopscotch skip counting and spatial relationship activities were a fantastic way to make math learning both enjoyable and effective. These activities were carefully designed to cater to the different mathematical needs and levels of students while promoting critical thinking and problem-solving skills.

There are more benefits like –

- Body control and dexterity, from balancing and moving down the course
- •Gross motor skills, including jumping and hopping.
- •Leg flexibility, from all of the rotational, forward-back, and sideways motions.
- •Counting skills
- •Coordination



Circle Time

Community helpers:

Teaching children about community helpers is important because it helps them understand the roles of people in society. They also understand the importance of cooperation and interdependence. Children start to recognize people whom they should contact in different emergencies.

Topic-1 : Activity(Verbs): Verb Charades

Learning Objectives: Students will be able to understand the actions we do are verbs.

Learning Outcomes: The students will be able to

- Use verbs or action words appropriately.
- Frame proper meaningful sentences with words of daily usage.
- Understand the importance of verbs.
- Understand and use verbs appropriately and enhance their creativity







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Procedure:

Prepare a set of verb cards with a variety of action words. Examples include running, jumping, swimming, dancing, eating, reading, writing, singing, etc.

- 1.Explain the rules of the game to the students. Let them know that they will be acting out the verbs without speaking or making any sounds, and their classmates will try to guess the verb being acted out.
- 2.Choose a student to be the first "actor." This student will randomly select a verb card without showing it to the others.
- 3.The actor will begin acting out the verb through physical movements, gestures, and expressions, while the rest of the class observes.
- 4.The other students in the class will try to guess the verb being acted out by the actor. They can raise their hands or take turns suggesting verbs until the correct verb is guessed.
- 5.Once the verb is correctly identified, choose another student to be the next actor, and repeat the process with a new verb card.



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English - Topic -2: Funny Thing Happened

Learning Objectives: Students will be able to understand that imagination and making predictions brings positivity in one's life as they can help us assist in making plans for development by Creative drawing.

Procedure: Kids will draw a forest and a black cat in the forest. (Yellow big eyes)

Learning Outcomes:

This activity promotes the development of physical skills, coordination, and fine motor abilities. By incorporating hands-on activities, students can enhance their psychomotor skills while learning. This activity helps in the development of creative and fine motor skills, neatness, presentation, time management, precision, and execution.







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English - Topic : Adjectives

Learning Objectives: Students will be able to understand the describing words of nouns as adjectives.

Procedure: Write down the names of various common objects on separate index cards or pieces of paper. On separate index cards or pieces of paper, write down adjectives that can be used to describe those objects (e.g., "soft," "colorful," "round," "furry," "hard," etc.). Mix up the cards so that the object cards and adjective cards are shuffled together.

shuffled together.

Learning Outcomes:

Students will have learnt the meaning of adjectives.

Students will make use of the adjectives and develop their vocabulary.
Students will use their creativity and frame as many words as possible in the antonym and synonym form for the given adjective.
Students will enjoy the activity and frame as many adjectives as possible for a given noun.



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Math -

Activity1-Multiplication of two-digit number with one-digit number without carrying

Learning Objectives: This is a traditional way of introducing multiplication to students at a primary level. Though it may seem a bit elaborative, it is an interesting way of learning multiplication of a 2-digit number with a 1-digit number without carrying and without the use of tables.

Procedure:

Materials required : Two A4 sheets of different color, one black sketch pen

Cut the A4 sheets into thin strips as shown in the picture below. Arrange the strips according to the multiplication problem given (multiplication without carrying). Ex: 12×3 arrange one blue stripe and two blue stripes as shown representing 12, and three yellow stripes over them representing 3. Mark the top intersection(3 dots) and bottom intersection (6 dots) with black sketch pen which results in 36. We can ask the children to multiply different numbers accordingly. Let them show at least 3 examples. 1. 13×2 2. 31×3 3. 14×2 (you can give your own)

Learning Outcome: Children will learn to multiply a 2 digit number with a 1-digit number (without carrying) without actually using tables.


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Math - Subtraction Learning Objectives: Learning Outcome: Children will learn to identify and use the symbol of subtraction. They will understand that a small number can only be subtracted from a bigger number. They will learn to write the numbers in their correct place.



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Procedure: Write a grid (hopscotch) of randomized numbers on the sidewalk (or tape one off on your classroom floor). A student tosses a pebble onto numbers and other students also take his turn and then ask them to make a subtraction equation out of their results.

Children will be able to understand that to subtract two numbers the bigger number should be written first and then the smaller number. They will understand that a smaller number can only be subtracted from a bigger number.

Gift Smart Learning Objectives - Children

will be able to -

- Establish connections with others by gifting.
- Understand the importance of gifting
- Understand the meaning of gifting smart

Procedure- Children will bring a gift worth Rs 5/-. Then place them in a box and pack it using

newspaper/colorful paper. After wrapping the gifts , They will exchange between friends.

Children will be able to recognize their physical features and characteristics.

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Procedure -

Finger Impression (bug, caterpillar, spider, snail, butterfly etc. Students have made small creatures using their finger impression on an A4 sheet paper. Then they drew their wings, eyes and other body parts using a black sketch pen.

Learning Outcomes -

Children were able to identify different types of insects, their physical features and characteristics. Children were able to know how they are a part of our ecosystem, their food cycles, their similarities and differences. Children were able to know the need for their conservation in detail.





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General Knowledge – Big Animals

Learning Objectives-

Children learnt about the importance of life on our planet. They were able to understand their natural and artificial habitat. Children were able to know about their physical characteristics, food, dangers they face and how climate change is affecting their decrease in numbers. They were able to understand the need to conserve them.

Procedure

Children have brought toys/3D pictures of big animals. Then they described their natural habitat, physical features, food etc. by showing them. They also discussed why and how to conserve them.




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Learning Outcomes-

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
Telugu (L2) – Sarala Padalu


Students learned Sarala padaalu through an interesting activity of word search. Word searches help to grow their vocabulary by pronouncing



A key benefit of riddles is that they can be sophisticated or simple, depending on the abilities of the student in question. Children participated in this activity very enthusiastically and actively showed their talent . It also helped them in exploring new ideas, It also boosts problem-solving capabilities in students.

Procedure: The teacher drew the roller coaster on the board to conduct the activity.


The selected student wrote any consecutive tens or hundreds or thousands of their Choice. The teacher gave


flashcards or chits to any 2 Children. Depending upon the number they hold, children select the correct rounding off the number (destination).

About the Activity: How Plants Survive?

The plants in our surroundings are not the same. They differ in their features and these features help them different places. survive in to Adaptations are special features that allow a plant or animal to live in a particular place or habitat. The students were informed about the different habitats and the features of different plants growing in those habitats. To help them understand the features practically, students of Grade 4 were taken to the school lawn to observe the various types of leaves. As they were observing the plants with broad leaves they were able to identify that these plants belong to the plains. They even observed the needle shaped leaves and connected it to the plants growing in coastal regions.



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


The assembly provided historical insights and emphasized unity, diversity, and cooperation. It aimed to instill a sense of pride and understanding of country's rich our history the among students.

Keeping up to the true spirits of the quote, DIP-SITES of Grade 11&12 visited ICICI Bank, Bachupally branch on 10th October, 2023 to experience the practical knowledge about how a bank functions. Bank executives briefly explained the entire functioning of the bank in a day- right from deposit/withdrawal of cash, cheque, account opening to different loans. Our DIP-SITES were very inquisitive and inquired numerous doubts- how cash is dealt, cheques entry, rate of loan, accounts, dealing with cyber frauds, immediate steps when we become a victim of any scam etc. from the bank staff who in turn very patiently clarified and explained all of them.
